A Free and Anonymous Monument

Pori Art Museum presents the extensive film installation *A Free and Anonymous Monument* by the English artists Jane & Louise Wilson. The 13-screen film installation produced by and first shown in BALTIC, England has been adapted especially to the exhibition premises at the Pori Art Museum.

A Free and Anonymous Monument examines the process of re-invention undergone by the former industrial areas in North East England. The filming locations include public spaces as well as cutting edge industrial sites. The focus is especially on the impact that modernism and the structural changes following it have had on architecture and town planning. One of the central sites is Apollo Pavilion designed in 1958 by artist Victor Pasmore and situated in the town of Peterlee. The now deteriorated pavilion represented the utopias and the ideals of pure form of the post-war modernist architecture.

A Free and Anonymous Monument examines the aesthetic and social values manifested in the urban environment. The shooting locations of the film installation bear points of connection with Pori. Like the area in North East England, Pori, the port city of old industry has undergone a phase of re-generation in the recent decades that has shaped its architecture and town planning. The installation offers an examination on architectural memory and the multiple layers of the built environment.

Jane & Louise Wilson's photographs and video installations typically examine the relationship between people and architectural space. They are interested of spaces and buildings that are closed, abandoned or somehow concealed as well as the manifestations of power through architecture.

Their works have been extensively shown in Europe and the US.
